No one gets all 'Cash 5' or 'Match 6'

HARRISBURG (AP) — Tuesday's "Match 6 Lotto" jackpot will be worth at least \$650,000 because no player holds a ticket with one row that matches all six winning numbers drawn in last night's game.

Today's "Pennsylvania Cash 5" jackpot will be worth at least \$340,000 because no player matched the five winning numbers drawn in last night's game.

Lottery officials said 97 players matched four numbers and won \$223.50 each; 3,391 players matched three numbers and won \$10.50 each; and 41,126 players matched two numbers and won \$1 each.
